It's London, but not as you know it

From pop-up shops to unique drinking experiences, **Paul Ewart** reveals the top 10 spots to eat, sleep, drink and play in the capital of cool

OU'VE done the Tower of London, trod the well-worn path around Buckingham Palace, gazed upon the kings and queens of Britain at the National Portrait Gallery and had your fill of fish and chips. So, what's next?

While London is one of the most visited cities in the world, many travellers often miss out on some great experiences and unique boroughs.

Veer away from the obvious tourist sights, leave your guidebook at home and spend your time in the city living like a local with these 10 Londoner-endorsed recommendations.

1. To market, to market

Fresh from its opening a few months ago, Pop Brixton is already becoming south London's newest foodie and creative hot spot.

As well as more than 20 mouthwatering food and drink vendors – including local favourites, Zoe's Ghana Kitchen and Baba G's – there's an array of independent retail outlets and a 200-capacity events area hosting TEDx Brixton talks, music gigs and cinema screenings.

While it's constructed from seriously Instagrammable shipping containers, this isn't a venue that's geared solely towards London's hipster population. Nope, at the core of this development is the community, so expect an experience that is authentically Brixton.

2. Pull an all-nighter

Film buffs, listen up. Want to attend a bona fide all-night movie screening in what is quite possibly the coolest cinema in the world? It's a cinema lauded by superstar director Quentin Tarantino, who proclaimed it to be his favourite of all-time. Introducing the Prince Charles Cinema.

Londoners in-the-know come for the bargain ticket prices, convivial atmosphere and the famous themed all-night movie marathons. That's 12 hours of back-to-back films spanning quirky foreign titles, cult classics and box-office smashes. While the mind boggles at just how much popcorn will be required to see you through the night, it's the ultimate cinephile experience. Be sure to stick around for your "survival photo" as the clock ticks around to 9 the next morning.

3. One night in Paris

You don't need to board the Eurostar to

find a taste of Paris. Savvy locals know that sumptuous French brasserie fare can be found a few tube stops away at Mayfair's Brasserie Chavot.

Though packed with French expats, local celebrities and London tastemakers, there's a definite lack of the pretension that would normally go hand-in-hand with a two Michelinstarred restaurant (yep, two!) located in one of London's most chichi boroughs. And what's more, this place offers some serious bang for your buck.

Kick things off with the rock oysters served with a lamb, pork and herb

crepinette (a meatball to the rest of us). While meatballs and oysters may not seem the most likely of bedfellows, this combination is typically French. Follow with the venue's signature dishes, including up-market versions of French classics such as snails bourguignon and daube de boeuf. **See brasseriechavot.com**

4. Up on the roof

Rooftop views don't come much better than the one from the Richard Branson-owned Babylon Roof Gardens. High on a seventh floor in Kensington, London skyline vistas meet 1.5 acres of themed parkland.

Although you might expect little substance given the strength of the surroundings, the food is surprisingly good. Contemporary British cuisine with an emphasis on seasonal produce, including a daily fresh seafood station.

And if it's just a drink you're after, you can kick back on the Babylon Terrace (overlooking the beautiful gardens) and sample one of their award-winning cocktails.

5. Pop up and shop

London's new design hot spot, Barnaby & Co is a true pop-up shop, changing location every week, from underground stations to cool art galleries. Featuring a range of quirky and fun homewares sourced from independent designers and small brands, all of whom can't be found on the high street.

Favourites include London-based Rosa & Clara Designs, whose signature flamingo-printed cushions and lampshades scream "buy me!".

6. Get your Om on Rise early and join locals who are all

keen to start the day the Zen way.
At Battersea Park's Peace Pagoda (a landmark on the banks of the Thames for more than 20 years) each morning, resident Buddhist monk Rev Gyora Nagase makes the short journey from his nearby temple to the pagoda, beating his drum and chanting

7. Farmyard fun

There can hardly be a less likely area in which to find a farm, but in Spitalfields – a stone's throw from the heart of the city and a few minutes from the packed curry houses of Brick Lane – you'll find Spitalfields City Farm.

An urban farmyard oasis that houses goats, sheep, chickens, donkeys and even a cow, it also has a shop and cafe.



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STAYING THERE

Apply your off-the-beaten track mantra to your hotel too with a stay at No.11 Cadogan Gardens, a property that is both boutique and unique. This tucked-away gem is set across four Victorian townhouses in an exclusive leafy address, just off Chelsea's posh Sloane Square. Back in its 19th century heyday, the area was home to London's bohemian artists and poets and their creative spirit lives on in the individually designed rooms and suites of the hotel.

A must-visit for kids, the farm also runs a multitude of events during the year, including craft markets and supper clubs in the summer, alongside the highlight of their events calendar, the annual Oxford versus Cambridge goat race, a farmyard fracas that is just as fun as it sounds.

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8. Take the plunge

An outdoor pool in chilly London? While it may have nothing on Sydney's Icebergs, the much-loved Brockwell Lido is lapped up (get it?) by locals and in the summer months, there's nowhere better to swim.

Situated in the corner of Brockwell Park between Brixton and Dulwich, this landmark has been at the heart of its community since 1937 and is one of the city's few remaining outdoor pools.

The 50m pool is surrounded by an art deco building housing a newly refurbished state-of-the-art gym and luxurious hydrotherapy area and its



on-site cafe has also won a *Time Out* Eating and Drinking award for "best park cafe".

Swimming aside, there's also a range of regular events on site, from film nights to furniture fairs.

10. Spa time

When the stresses and strains of city life get too much, weary Londoners hit the spa. And while staying in the city's top tier five-star hotels are out of reach of most wallets, their world-class spas aren't.

One of the best is nestled in the basement of Marylebone's Landmark Hotel. Recently refurbished, it boasts a state-of-the-art spa with two relaxation areas, a range of massages, scrubs, wraps and facials and a small but well-equipped gym overlooking the pool. The hour-long seaweed oil massage, which is guaranteed to tease out sightseeing knots, comes highly recommended.
